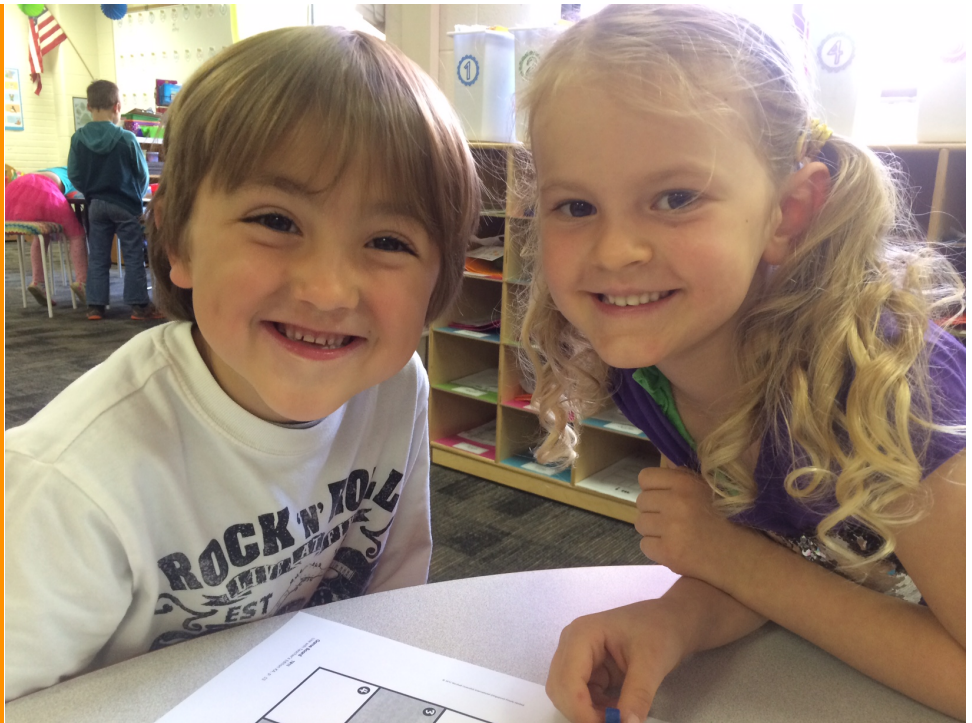

What We've Practiced This Week

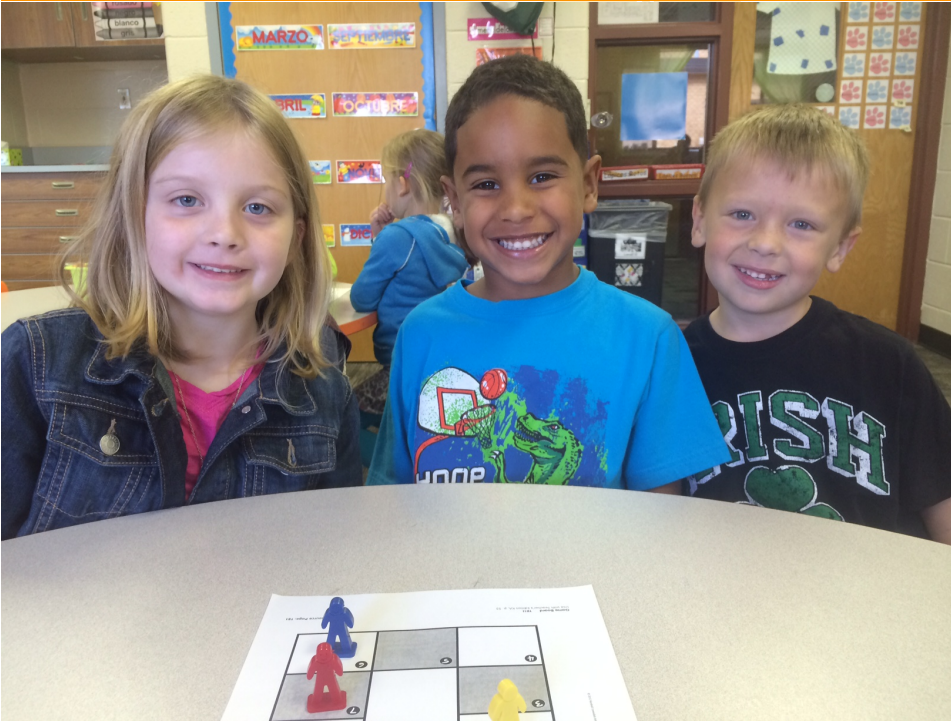
Reading: We spent our reading time this week practicing the letter Tt and blending it with vowels to make the syllables “*ta, te, ti, to, tu.*” We also practiced identifying rhyming words and creating funny rhymes. We reviewed the words *yo, estoy, bien, tú, el* and *la*. This weekend you can help your child practice these sight words and read aloud to your child in English!

Math: We focused on the numbers eight and nine this week during math time. Not only did we practice counting up to nine objects in a group, but we also talked about how the total of a set doesn't change if we simply change the order of the objects. We also began to learn about the words “*más*” and “*menos*,” as we learned to explain which of two numbers was greater.

Writing: This week we practiced writing sentences with number words. We wrote serious sentences like, “*Yo tengo dos perros,*” and some silly sentences like, “*Yo tengo cuatro ojos.*” We also started our sentences with a capital letter, continued with lowercase letters, left spaces between words, and ended with a period.

Living Things: This week we began to learn all about living and nonliving things. First, we learned that animals and plants are living things. We discussed what living things can do and what they need to survive. We had fun completing different sorting activities and watching a couple “time elapse” videos to see how plants, animals, and people grow!
